

From The Pastor

"NOT NORMAL!"

I recently was delighted to be able to accompany our St. Paul Lutheran School children on a trip to Mission Central in Mapleton, Iowa. (You can read Principal Penrose's article about the trip in this edition of the Reporter.) I won't repeat the details that she shares, but I've been reflecting on a few things that Gary Thies said as he took us on a visual tour of what's currently happening on the mission field.

In various ways, he illustrated to us, in his own engaging and humorous way, how God does great things through people who are, in his words, "not normal!" He meant that in a good way. It's not normal, for example, for someone to leave behind all that is familiar and comfortable, and take his or her family to a foreign land and into a completely different culture. But that's what missionaries do.

It's "not normal" for people to be so moved by God's call to make disciples of all nations, that they give generously and sacrificially to support the mission of the Church. But that's what so many Christians do!

It's "not normal" for a person to risk his freedom and his life by sharing the life-changing power of the Gospel message in countries which forbid people to speak about Jesus as the true and living Lord. But that's what so many brave Christians are doing, all over the world.

Gary Theis gave many examples of how the Gospel is "breaking out" in powerful ways among people who show a hunger for its unique message. He spoke of people who have only heard of a demanding god, (or gods) who expect you to somehow earn or merit their favor. They are left with uncertainty, as to what will happen to them when they die, as they never know if they've done enough to please these demanding gods.

Then, the word reaches them that there is a completely different message—one that inspires hope, and that offers real power and help from a gracious and loving God who loves us so much that he became one of us, and took our punishment for sin upon Himself... and that his name is Jesus! That message at first seems, "Not normal!" But it sounds wonderful! And it is.

Gary shared his observation that in some parts of the world, people have reached a point where they are sick and tired of the burden of living under a demanding, harsh religion, or of some vague spirituality that puts all the burden on oneself. These people are open to the Gospel message, and we can't get missionaries to them fast enough to fill the need!

Perhaps one application we can draw from all of this is to thank God that what he did to save us was not the "normal" thing, which demands that we earn our salvation. Jesus wasn't "normal."

And likewise, we are called to be different. We believe in what we cannot see. We believe in miracles. We believe that for Christians, life continues forever, in heaven.

In this upcoming season of Thanksgiving and into the celebration of Christ's birth, let's be open to Christ and his calling on our life. Let's not settle for being "ordinary" or "normal" in our response to God's grace. Let's seek to excel in the things which please our Heavenly Father.

Rob Cooksey, head of Concordia Schools in Omaha, led a session entitled, "Starbucks Lutheran School". The theory behind this interesting title is that our Lutheran Schools can become a third place for many of our families. Ray Oldenburg, an American Sociologist, first coined the term of third place concept as "...distinctive informal gathering areas that make one feel at home and allow people to relax and unwind after a long day at work." Third place environments nourish relationships, promote companionships and help create a sense of place and community. I believe St. Paul Lutheran Ministries is providing and maintaining a place for our families as we foster and build relationships among our church members, school families, the community, and most importantly with our Lord Jesus Christ. I am reminded through this concept, the words of the Great Commission in Matthew 28:16-20: "Then the eleven disciples went to Galilee, to the mountain where Jesus had told them to go. When they saw him, they worshiped him; but some doubted. Then Jesus came to them and said, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age." I have never been so proud of our ministry as I was during our Oktoberfest celebration held early in October. What an amazing turn out of people to worship with. The talents of our church were showcased and given to glorify God. This truly was a community of believers gathering together to carry out the Great Commission set forth for us in the book of Matthew. I am excited to see how we continue the third place initiative in our church and school in the months and years to come.

LCMS Nebraska District Educator's Conference


Terry Schmidt, head of our LCMS Lutheran School system, was keynote speaker for this year's LCMS NE Lutheran Educator's Conference, held at Trinity Lutheran Church and School in Grand Island. Terry spoke on how Lutheran Schools are "Raising the Bar" by engaging in the pursuit of witness, mercy and life together. Our schools need to feel empowered to share the life-changing message of Jesus' love with more and more people. Lutheran schools need to partner with Christian families in the task of raising up the next generation of faithful disciples as well as partnering with community families in the task of providing excellent academic preparation for their children. Every schools' success and failure is directly related to a sustainable future for the LCMS. Through the power of the Holy Spirit, Lutheran Schools transform lives. Lutheran schools connect our congregations with their communities. Terry noted that we have a well developed system of schools already in place with a rich history of serving families and children. Investing in our staff through leadership development opportunities and intentional administrator training will create quality instruction and ministry enhancement within our schools. In order to serve our students better we must provide authentic assessment, accommodations, service learning, professional learning communities, life skills, critical thinking, applied learning, and differentiation within our classrooms and our schools. The LCMS NE District is at the forefront of this educational age through Project Compass. Project Compass is comprised of 4 areas: Concordia Curriculum Guide, Curriculum Mapping, MAPS Testing, and Accreditation with NLSA. 38 elementary schools and 4 high schools in the Nebraska District are eligible to participate in Project Compass. St. Paul Lutheran School, West Point is currently one of seven schools that are participating in all 4 areas.
